

GENERAL LEJEUNE'S BIRTHDAY MESSAGE

On November 10, 1775, a Corps of Marines was created by a resolution of the Continental Congress. Since that date many thousand men have borne the name Marine. In memory of them it is fitting that we who are Marines should commemorate the birthday of our Corps by calling to mind the glories of its long and illustrious history.

The record of our Corps is one, which will bear comparison with that of the most famous military organizations in the world's history. During 90 of the 167 years of its existence the Marine Corps has been in action against the Nation's foes. From the battle of Trenton to the Argonne, Marines have won foremost honors in war, and in the long eras of tranquility at home generation after generation of Marines have grown gray in war in both hemispheres, and in every corner of the seven seas, that our country and its citizens might enjoy peace and security.

In every battle and skirmish since the birth of our Corps Marines have acquitted themselves with the greatest distinction, winning new honors on each occasion until the term "Marine" has come to signify all that is highest in military efficiency and soldierly virtue.

This high name of distinction and soldierly repute we who are Marines today have received from those who preceded us in the corps. With it we also received from them the eternal spirit which has animated our Corps from generation to generation and has been the distinguishing mark of Marines in every age. So long as that spirit continues to flourish Marines will be found equal to every emergency in the future as they have been in the past, and the men of our Nation will regard us as worthy successors to the long line of illustrious men who have served as "Soldiers of the Sea" since the founding of the Corps.

Sergeant Major, USMC (Retired) Jim Harkins



Sergeant Major Jim Harkins enlisted in the Marine Corps Reserve, 4th Tank Battalion in July 1959. Upon graduation from Mission Bay High School, he reported to Golf Co., 2nd Battalion, Recruit Training Regiment. He was promoted meritoriously to private first class upon graduation and opted to go on active duty. He reported to the Infantry Training Regiment for

additional training before assignment to Golf Co., 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines, 1st Marine Division. He participated in the Marine Corps infantry squad competition, placing third and was meritoriously promoted to Lance Corporal. His battalion was reassigned to the 3rd Marine Division, located in Japan, and his company designated Charlie company, 1st Battalion, 9th Marines. During this tour Harkins was promoted to Corporal. Upon completion of his tour, Corporal Harkins reported to Camp Pendleton, California assigned as the turnkey for the brig. Promoted to Sergeant, he reported to Fox company, Marine Security Guard Battalion for duty with the Department of State. Sergeant Harkins served at the American Embassies in Algiers, Algeria, Monrovia, and Liberia, during this tour.

After 30 months on embassy duty, now Staff Sergeant Harkins was assigned as the S-4 operations chief, 2nd Battalion, 2nd Marines, 2nd Marine Division. He then received orders to the Republic of Vietnam where he served as a platoon commander in Hotel Company, 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines, 1st Marine Division. Reassigned to the G-2 section, 1st Marine Division, he participated in numerous intelligence gathering operations for the remainder of his tour in Vietnam.

Staff Sergeant Harkins was then assigned to Drill Instructor School, MCRD San Diego, where he graduated first in his class and was awarded a noncommissioned officers sword. Assigned to Lima Company, 3rd Battalion, his work ethic and superior performance helped him to earn meritorious promotion to Gunnery Sergeant.

Gunnery Sergeant Harkins was assigned as platoon commander, Motivation Platoon, Special Training Branch for the remainder of his



tour. Upon successful completion of drill instructor duty, he reported to Landing Force Training Command Pacific. As an infantry skills instructor, he traveled extensively throughout the western Pacific training Marines and

Sailors. His next assignment was a tour as the Gunnery Sergeant for Alpha Company, 1st Battalion, 9th Marines, 3rd Marine Division, Japan.

Gunnery Sergeant Harkins then returned for a tour with Fox Company, Marine Security Guard Battalion. He was assigned as the noncommissioned officer in charge, American Consul General, Calcutta, India, for three years and then the American embassy, Grand Duchy of Luxembourg.

Promoted to First Sergeant, he was assigned to India Battery, 3rd Battalion, 11th Marines, 1st Marine Division and then Headquarters Battery, 3rd Battalion, 11th Marines. First Sergeant Harkins was then assigned as the First Sergeant, Marine Detachment, USS Ranger, where he served with Major Jan Huly, the Detachment Commander. Selected for Sergeant Major, he reported to 1st Amtrac Battalion, 1st Marine Division. Follow on assignments as Sergeant Major included tours with the Infantry Training School, Camp Pendleton and assignment with the Inspector General's Office, 1st Marine Division. Sergeant Major Harkins retired in August 1985 after 26 years of service.

His personal decorations include the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal and the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal. Sergeant Major Harkins is a native of San Diego, California. He has two sons, Steve, and Jonathan, and three grandchildren, Tylor, Amber, and Christian.
